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FOREWORD

Two million girls drive us in the work we undertake in Ecuador. 2019 was a year full of activities and projects; achievements and challenges. A total of 430,457 children and adults benefited from our programs in 9 provinces. In addition, the 30th anniversary of the Convention on the Rights of the Child was commemorated. Ecuador was one of the first countries to ratify this international treaty, which provides countries with a common ethical-legal framework on the rights of children.

Thirty years after its approval, the conditions of children have improved, particularly with regard to reduced infant mortality and access to basic education and health. However, many challenges remain. For example, Ecuador has the second highest teenage pregnancy rate in South America.

Together with all our partners, we continue to work in those areas where change is needed. We know that behind each piece of data there is a girl, projects, dreams. As a society, we are in debt to that girl, and to everyone. Eliminating violence and discrimination, promoting leadership, improving the quality of education and increasing the participation of children and adolescents in decisions that affect them were just some of the areas in which we contributed in 2019.

Through our work, we have shown that when girls have the necessary tools, they become the protagonists of their lives. They can provide the support their families and communities need to get ahead. We want an Ecuador with zero tolerance in discrimination and inequality against girls.

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WHO ARE WE?

We are one of the world's largest development and humanitarian organizations, founded in 1937 in Spain. With no political, religious or governmental affiliation, we strive for a just world that advances children's rights and equality for girls. We promote change of social behaviour and public policies at local, national and global levels through our reach, experience and knowledge.

We recognize the power and potential of each child. But this potential is usually limited by barriers such as poverty, violence, exclusion and discrimination. And girls are the most affected. We work together with girls, boys, young people, communities, donors and partners to address the root cause of the challenges facing girls and thus achieve significant changes.

We work with girls and boys to develop their abilities, from birth until adulthood. In addition, we contribute to communities, ensuring that they are prepared and can respond to crises and overcome adversity.

WHO ARE WE?

We have implemented the "Girls Get Equal" campaign, a social change initiative that promotes collective efforts to drive the global movement for girls' rights through diverse actions, investments and commitments.

We have been present in Ecuador since 1962. Our projects are developed in nine provinces throughout the country and focus on areas such as education, entrepreneurship, sexual and reproductive rights, early childhood, risk management, citizen participation, leadership and child protection.

SAFE ZONES TEACH RISK PREVENTION, LEADERSHIP DEVELOPMENT AND HOW TO DRIVE CHANGE AND EQUALITY

Strengthening Early Warning Systems in communities.

1,000 people participated in 38 workshops to increase first aid and fire prevention skills among the community.

Response to the migration crisis: 59,982 people served.

Thousands of Venezuelans have entered Ecuador. The country also serves as a transit country for many people. During migration, it is women, girls and young people who are most exposed to vulnerable situations, including violence, discrimination as well as labour and sexual exploitation. Migration also means that family and social ties are broken.





To support the migratory crisis affecting the region, the following projects were implemented:

1) Support on the Ecuador and Peru Border:

We provide support to migrant families - especially women and girls at the Binational Border Assistance Centre (CEBAF) to ensure a safe crossing. Plan was the only organization that provided a space for adolescents where they received information on the prevention of violence and sexual and reproductive rights. We also offered psychosocial support to adults and helped to fill in the documents required to enter Peru.

2) "Building Resilient Educational Communities":

We promote access to education for migrant and refugee children and adolescents together with UNICEF and ECHO. We provided 400 educational kits and supported the Ministry of Education in the implementation of the protocol for the inclusion of migrant children.

3) Food assistance:

In the Highlands, with the support of the World Food Program, migrant families received food assistance and workshops on how to improve their eating habits and prevent violence against children.

4) "Education cannot wait":

Plan promoted the access of 51,000 migrant children to quality education in 5 cities in Ecuador.

5) Socio-economic integration:

This initiative promoted the socio-economic integration of the Venezuelan migrant population that has been established in Ecuador and Peru. In coordination with local governments, Plan worked to facilitate access to health, education and early childhood development services.

38,086 children participated in early childhood programs.

448 community activities targeting parents to develop resilient, healthy and protected children from violence.

Campaign "Dads who care" reached 396,664 people.

WHAT IS THE Dadswho Care CAMPAIGN?

The Dads Who Care campaign, launched by Plan Ecuador in 2019, seeks to:

1) Increase the participation of fathers in their children's upbringing, especially during early childhood.

2) Raise awareness among society on the importance of the male figure in the home, daily care and family well-being.

The initiative is a call for action for men to become involved in their children's care, with a focus on zero discrimination and violence. Fathers involved in the home are happier, have better physical and mental health and have a lower risk of alcohol or drug abuse.

When fathers are actively involved in home care the mothers' quality of life improves because responsibility for parenting and household chores is shared. The presence of the father is also a positive factor in the childbirth and postpartum experience.

Similarly, a responsible and present father figure has a positive effect on children. Children raised in a healthy family environment have greater educational opportunities, a higher level of self-esteem and greater possibilities of protecting themselves from violence.

DRIVES LEADERSHIP AND INFLUENCE THROUGH THE BECAUSE I AM A GIRL MOVEMENT (MPSN)

280 adolescents and young people, 255 women and 25 men participated in MPSN.

6 young people from the MPSN participated in 5 global meetings: Women Deliver (Canada), International Forum on Inclusion and Equity in Education (Colombia), Youth Leadership Camp Youth Now! and Preparatory Meeting of Latin America and the Caribbean for the Nairobi Summit (Mexico), Nairobi Summit: ICPD 25 (Kenya) and Commemorative Meeting for the 30 years of the Convention on the Rights of the Child (Belgium).

161 Takeovers were performed at national level in key institutions. **152,406 people** participated in these events.

What are takeovers?

These are activities undertaken by girls and young people that make visible the change they wish to achieve towards gender equality. They are implemented in public and private institutions, where girls symbolically occupy positions of power to demonstrate that they can play any role.

In addition, influential personalities have the opportunity to commit to the rights of girls.



An initiative promoted by Plan International Ecuador whose objective is to consolidate an autonomous and sustainable civil society movement led by adolescents and young women at local and national levels.

The Movement was formally established in 2018, as a result of years of work by Plan in strengthening girls' capacities to exercise their rights.

OBJECTIVES OF THE MOVEMENT

Defend the rights of girls, adolescents and young women in Ecuador and promote gender equality.

- Participate and influence decision-making spaces so that their voices and demands are taken into account.
- Question gender stereotypes and change social behaviour as a means of building a fair society free from discrimination and violence.

FURTHER INFORMATION:

- Is a space to reflect and generate proposals to transform the situations of inequality they face.
- Recognizes and promotes the participation of adolescents and young men to achieve equality. Adolescents and young people are committed to building new masculinities.
- Its members have held meetings to strengthen their leadership and advocacy skills; design an organizational structure and draw up an action plan as well as generate links based on sorority and solidarity.
- Its commitment has allowed it to grow and consolidate itself as a leading organization in the struggle for rights and equality.

Two MPSN representatives made presentations on early and forced unions and their impact on the lives of girls and adolescents.

Leadership Schools

Plan implemented 13 Leadership Schools with the objective of strengthening the capacities of young women to lead changes in socio-cultural patterns and defend their rights. Thanks to agreements with private companies, the participation of mentors to encourage and accompany the empowerment process among the participants was promoted.

MPSN Congress in Guamote.

An intergenerational dialogue was held between MPSN representatives, the Guamote Confederation of Indigenous Women's Organizations and the Confederation of the Indigenous Movement of Chimborazo.

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International Forum on Inclusion and Equity in Education (Colombia):

A MPSN leader made a presentation to promote intercultural and gender-transforming education.

Day of the Girl

106 gender workshops and takeovers were undertaken in schools and colleges nationwide, with the aim of raising girls' voices in spaces of power and decision making, thus changing stereotypes and traditional roles.

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Nairobi Summit on the ICPD +25

MPSN Leaders and the Plan International delegation that participated in the Summit to drive the commitment of the states with respect to the sexual and reproductive rights of adolescents and the prevention of teenage pregnancy.

30th Anniversary of the Convention on the Rights of the Child

A MPSN representative participated in the meeting of the Convention on the Rights of the Child in Belgium.

International Day for the Elimination of Violence against Women and 16 Days of Activism:

- For the second consecutive year, the MPSN took over the National Court of Justice. The President of the Court reported on the progress made in gender matters during her administration. The State Attorney General pledged to continue working so that girls and adolescents have access to specialized justice and commitment to their rights.
- MPSN representatives and other organizations met with Dubravka Šimonović, the United Nations Special Rapporteur, to discuss violence against women, its causes and consequences and to demonstrate the situations of violence faced by girls and adolescents. The participants delivered the Manifesto for a free and non-violent life, cited by the Rapporteur in her report to the government.
- MPSN Representatives took over the Plenary Session of the Constitutional Court to demonstrate the nature of the violence and discrimination they face, and to commit the judges to ensure that their verdicts guarantee the exercise of their rights.
